



Research Objectives


(1) To identify China's foreign policy in the East and South China Seas under President Xi Jinping's administration and their implications on Thailand.

(2) To propose some policy recommendations for Thai Foreign policy in accordance with the situation in the international system, as affected by China's foreign policy in the South and East China Seas.


















Situations in Thailand and Her Response to China's Moves (1)









Thai-China Economic Relations (1)





Thai-China Economic Relations (2)





Thailand Exports to China



Conclusions and Policy Recommendations for Thailand
